

# The Trinity - a lived experience

- The sermon suggests that understanding God fully is beyond human comprehension. How do you reconcile the mystery of the Trinity with your personal faith? How does Jesus' conversation with Nicodemus (John 3:1-17) illustrate the challenges of comprehending spiritual truths?
