"Do You Not Perceive It?" - God's New Thing Among Us

Based on Isaiah 43:16-21 & John 12:1-8

• Opening reflection on change:

Invites the congregation to reflect on their relationship with change — whether we welcome it or resist it often depends on our comfort with the present.

Context of Isaiah 43:

God's people are exiled in Babylon, longing for change. Isaiah offers a message of hope and encouragement rather than judgment.

• Remembering God's past faithfulness:

Isaiah reminds the people of God's past deliverance from Egypt — the parting of the Red Sea — but then says, "Do not remember the former things." This paradox is explored: we remember God's faithfulness not to dwell in the past but to have hope for the future.

God is doing a new thing:

A call to attentiveness — "Do you not perceive it?"

We must not miss what God is doing now by clinging too tightly to how things have always been.

• This applies personally and communally:

Our lives, and the life of Beverley Minster, are "His Story" — a story of God's ongoing grace. There is a sense of the Holy Spirit doing something new in this place, and everyone has a role in it.

• Mary's anointing of Jesus (John 12):

Mary recognises the moment and responds with extravagant generosity. Her gift is prophetic, timely, and deeply personal.

She models attentive discipleship — staying close enough to Jesus to understand what he is doing.

Contrast with Judas:

Judas reacts with criticism and hardness of heart, missing the significance of the moment. His judgment of Mary reveals a spiritual blindness and ultimately contributes to his betrayal.

• Martha's service also valued:

Martha, often overlooked, is faithfully serving in her way — a reminder that we each offer different gifts.

Closing invitation:

As Lent progresses, the congregation is encouraged to reflect in silence:

What new thing is the Holy Spirit doing? What is our response? Are we ready to be part of it?

Questions:

- 1. Isaiah 43 reminds us of God's mighty acts in the past but also tells us not to "remember the former things."
 - How can we balance remembering God's faithfulness in the past with being open to the "new thing" God is doing today?
- 2. "Do you not perceive it?" Isaiah asks.
 - What helps or hinders us from perceiving the new things God may be doing in our lives or in our community right now?
- 3. Mary's act of anointing Jesus was generous, spontaneous, and deeply personal.
 - What might it look like for us to show such devotion to Jesus in our own context today?
- 4. Judas criticised Mary's act, seeing it as wasteful.
 - How do we sometimes judge others' expressions of faith, and what might that reveal about our own hearts?
- 5. The sermon spoke about different gifts hospitality, time, service, finances.
 - What gift has God given you, and how might He be inviting you to use it in this season?
- 6. "Can you not sense that the Holy Spirit is doing something new in this place?" Do you sense God is doing something new in your church or life right now? What might your response be?
