Sermon Title: Who are our heroes?

• **St Peter's Feast Day**: The sermon reflects on Peter's journey from an impetuous fisherman to a foundational leader in the early church, using readings from Matthew 16, John 21, and Acts 4.

Peter's Story Arc:

- o Begins as a bold, outspoken follower of Jesus.
- Denies Jesus at His trial (Maundy Thursday).
- o Is lovingly restored by Jesus at the Sea of Galilee (John 21).
- Transformed by the Holy Spirit at Pentecost into a courageous, gospel-preaching leader (Acts 4).
- Boldness through the Spirit: Peter always had courage, but the Holy Spirit redirected that boldness toward God's mission, giving him deeper understanding, humility, and selflessness.

Heroes vs. Saints:

- Cultural heroes (sports stars, artists, superheroes) achieve greatness through strength and skill.
- Saints rely not on their own power, but on God's Spirit working through them.
- o Peter exemplifies this transition—from respected hero to Spirit-empowered saint.
- Ordinary Saints Among Us: Saints are not just historic figures like St Teresa of Calcutta, but everyday people around us—faithful, prayerful, and Spirit-filled.

• Personal Challenge:

- Each of us is called to be more than a hero—to be a saint.
- The Holy Spirit is still active and available to those who ask.
- What might the Spirit be prompting you to do?
- We are encouraged to reflect this week on how we are being called to be saints in our own lives and communities.

Questions

1. "Who do you say that I am?" (Matthew 16:15)

- How does Peter's answer to Jesus shape our understanding of discipleship? What does it mean to truly "get" who Jesus is?

2. Peter's denial and restoration (John 21:15–17)

- How do you relate to Peter's journey from failure to forgiveness and restoration? What does it show us about grace and second chances?

3. The transformation at Pentecost (Acts 4)

– What difference did the Holy Spirit make in Peter's life? Have you ever experienced—or longed for—that kind of transformation in your own life?

4. Heroes vs. Saints

– The sermon contrasts secular "heroes" who triumph through strength with saints who rely on God. What does this difference reveal about Christian identity and calling?

5. Ordinary Saints

– Who are the "ordinary saints" in your own life or community? What makes them stand out as examples of faith or spiritual courage?

6. Your own calling

- The sermon challenges us to ask, "In what ways are you called to be a saint?" What might the Holy Spirit be prompting in you today—and what boldness might you need to step into it?
